Radio TeensHK Host – Sandra	Welcome to <i>Radio TeensHK</i> . Today the focus is on the ancient and modern wonders of the world. Let's welcome Professor Pang from the International University of Hong Kong (IUHK) and IUHK History student, Tony Wong. Welcome, Professor Pang and Tony.
Professor Pang and Tony Wong	Thanks, Sandra.
Radio TeensHK Host – Sandra	So, Professor, your area of study is Ancient Chinese History. Is that right?
Professor Pang	Yes. My area of study is Ancient Chinese History but my speciality is the Great Wall of China. It's considered to be one of the great wonders of the world.
Radio TeensHK Host – Sandra	I think it's the only man-made structure that can be seen from the moon.
Tony – History student	Actually, Sandra, you're wrong. That claim is false. It can't be seen from the moon at all.
Radio TeensHK Host – Sandra	Oh, I see. Anyway, Tony, when and why was the Great Wall built?
Tony – History student	It was started in the 7 th century BC, with several walls being built. These walls were later joined together and made bigger and stronger.
	The wall was built to protect the borders of China from enemies and attacks. It was also used for transportation. Defences, to help prevent against attacks, were also added.
Radio TeensHK Host – Sandra	Oh really? Like what, Tony?
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Tony – History student	They built watch towers, troop barracks, garrison stations and ways to signal using smoke or fire.
Radio TeensHK Host – Sandra	Really! Now for those of us who don't understand, please explain what watch towers, troop barracks and garrison stations are.
Tony – History student Professor Pang	I think I'll let the professor explain.
	Thanks, Tony. Watch towers were built so that the people on the wall could see into the distance and warn about an attack.
	The wall was built for defence purposes so soldiers would have been stationed there, living in the barracks, ready to protect and fight.
	The barracks were just buildings built to house the soldiers. Garrison stations were where big groups of soldiers protected the area.
Radio TeensHK Host – Sandra	Wow, how interesting! What was the wall made of?
Tony – History student	It was made of stones, bricks, earth, wood and other materials like tiles and lime. Using bricks made building easier and faster.
Radio TeensHK Host – Sandra	Wow, and it's still standing today. That's impressive!
Tony – History student	(<i>sigh</i>) Well, some parts are still standing today. Sadly, some parts have not been preserved and have been damaged. Thieves have stolen bricks and sold them. Graffiti artists have painted on the wall. Some people have even destroyed parts of the wall to make a road.
Radio TeensHK Host – Sandra	That's a shame. Let's take a break. After the break, we'll talk about(<i>fade out</i>)]
